Celebrating the Season of Lent



Theme: A Deeper Vision

According to the Gospel of John, early in Jesus' ministry he encounters a woman at a well who is drawing water at midday. Transcending the social norms of his day, Jesus engages the woman in conversation. Through the give and take of human interaction, of human conversation, the woman slowly comes to believe in Jesus. So excited by her newfound faith, she rushes into her village to share the good news with the townspeople. Similarly, the townspeople, through their interaction with Jesus, likewise come to faith.

Like any good story, the encounter between the Samaritan woman at the well and Jesus is powerful because it sheds light on what it means to be human. We see in her story, our own story, we see something of our own journey. The story of the Samaritan woman rings true because in a way, she is each of us. Why? How? Her story possesses the power to remind each of us how we came to believe, whether there was a particularly powerful moment or more likely, a process full of moments that watered the seed of faith to grow into a beautiful flower. Her excitement challenges us to reflect on what our faith means to us. Her willingness to share her experience with the townspeople calls us to consider what our faith is asking of each of us, to consider the shape and substance of our lives in light of our faith. During this Third Week of Lent, and beyond, let us take advantage of this unique opportunity to remember, to remember how we came to believe, what our belief means to us, and where our belief is leading us. When I reflect on the story of the Samaritan woman, I just might discover the invitation to a more authentic, more faith-filled, more meaningful life.
