Theme: The Power of Candles

Prior to the abolition of apartheid in South Africa, many who were committed to ending this system of injustice would often light a candle and place it in the window. The lighted candles in windows became a powerful sign of hope that apartheid would one day be overcome and all could live in freedom and peace. Knowing this, the authorities cracked down on the practice, making it illegal to have a lit candle in your window. During this period, it was as illegal to have a lit candle in the window of your house as it was to carry a firearm. Those who worked diligently to overcome oppression looked back on the experience, recognizing that the candles were ultimately more powerful than firearms. Hope is more powerful than fear, injustice, and armed might.

Easter is the feast day of hope. It is the day we celebrate that life and love, faith and hope, are more powerful than violence, than oppression, more powerful than whatever enslaves us. The cynical may doubt the power of hope. And yet, we know that sometimes lit candles defeat guns. Some hopes are realized. We get our dream job. We write that book. We marry the love of our life. The crucified Jesus appears to family and friends, the embodiment of a promise too grand for words. These experiences are a foretaste of the new and everlasting life promised to us by God. In many ways, the season of Lent is a special time for us to renew our trust in the promises of God. Easter is the great feast of the church year, the great celebration that foreshadows the fulfillment of the promises of God. It is the celebration of new life, new life that comes, not from the avoidance of suffering and death but in a mysterious way, through it. Life can be hard. Death is painful. Yet, Easter reminds us that neither the hardness of life nor the sadness of death speaks the final word on our existence. The final word belongs to God, and it is a word of love, a word of life forevermore. It is a word that calls us to place our trust in the promises of God. It is a word that calls us to reflect in our lives the truth of Easter life. May our lives be lighted candles for people and for a world often shrouded in darkness.
